Concerns about terror attack during G7 Summit and related ministerial meeting

Terror attacks were conducted during Summits around the world because these kinds of attacks have a huge impact.

Moreover, terror attacks on ships were also conducted in the past.

Therefore, it is important to be vigilant about terror attacks around waterfront areas and on ships.

■ G8 Gleneagles (2005)



During the London Summit, about 700 were wounded and 56 were killed.

■Bombing on "Super Ferry No.14" (2004)



In 2004, in the Philippines, a second-hand television set containing a 3.6kg TNT bomb had been placed and exploded.

As a result, 63 were killed, 53 went missing, and hundreds of passengers were wounded.

7 Recommendations for preventing terror attacks

1. Be aware of attacks in other countries!

Terror attacks were conducted in Japan as well. Be vigilant about these kinds of attacks.



2. Keep ships and facilities clean!



I can't place a bomb!?

It is difficult to place suspicious objects in clean areas, and also makes it easier to find them.

3. Enforce strict access control!

Confirm ID and name tags of all visitors. In addition, keep a record of visitors coming in and going out.

4. Ensure security for preventing attacks

- ①Patrol thoroughly inside ships and facilities in order to find suspicious persons and objects.
- **♦**Lock doors and warehouses that aren't used normally.
- ◇Put stickers on the places where fire hydrants, fire extinguishers, and AEDs are set up.
- **♦**Use checklists! **⇒**See sample on reverse side

② Be vigilant about neighboring areas of ships and facilities.

In foreign countries, terror attacks were conducted using small vessels and drones.



If you find any suspicious boats or drones, evacuate to a safe place and notify the Coast Guard or Police!

5. Notify when you find any suspicious objects ASAP!

If you find any suspicious objects, please notify the Coast Guard or Police without touching it/them!

Key phrase [Don't step on, touch, or kick].

What are suspicious objects?

Objects set up unusually Objects set up intentionally by suspicious persons

Objects that might be explosive, or whose contents have not been identified.

6. Encourage communication!

If you notice someone who looks like they are feeling sick, someone who has a lot baggage, or someone who looks like something is wrong, please actively communicate with them!

7. Cooperation (establish relationships in person)

Cooperate with agencies such as the Coast Guard, police, and fire department in order to prepare for accidents or terror attacks.

Confirm routine reports and contact information of your organization.
